Club Particulars

Hungerford Town Football Club is a members club which is run by volunteers. An Executive Committee and Community Committee are elected by registered club members at the Annual General Meeting in June of each year.

Ground Regulations

Please take note of the following information ...



Hungerford Town Football Club reserves the right to prosecute, refuse access to the ground or eject any person who within the club premises is deemed to behave in any of the following ways:

- Entering the field of play.
- Using offensive, obscene or vulgar language and/or gestures.
- Being under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- Using terms of racial abuse.
- Fireworks, flares, smoke canisters, knives and any other article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety are not permitted within the ground.
- The throwing of any object within the ground is strictly forbidden.
- Taunting opposing team supporters.
- Entering areas reserved for opposing supporters.
- The playing of ball games during match days is forbidden other than in designated areas.
- The riding of bicycles, scooters and skateboards around the ground on match days is forbidden.
- The climbing of floodlight pylons, stands or any other structure within the ground is forbidden.
- During matches glasses and bottles must not be taken outside of the clubhouse and alcohol must only be consumed from plastic containers outside of the clubhouse.

The club may, at its discretion, bar anyone guilty of such offence for a period of up to 5 years. He/she has the right of appeal for reconsideration of the term after a period of 12 months has elapsed. Such an application must be made in writing to the club whose decision will be final.

We also ask that all supporters co-operate and observe the following:

- Conduct themselves in an orderly fashion and refrain from any one or combination of the following: racist, violent, threatening, abusive, obscene or provocative behaviour, conduct, language or chanting.
- Emergency access routes must be kept clear at all times. Any vehicle causing an obstruction may be removed.
- Vehicles are parked in the car park at the owners/drivers risk. The club accepts no responsibility for damage to vehicles howsoever caused.
- Play cannot be guaranteed to take place on any particular day or at any particular time and the club management reserve the right to change its advertised fixtures without notice and liability.
- If a match or season ticket is re-sold or transferred without the previous written consent of the club it will become void and the holder may be refused entry to or ejected from the ground.
- The club management reserves the right to refuse admission to, or eject from, the ground any person who refuses to comply with an instruction of a safety officer or steward or refuses to be searched by any servant or agent of the club or any police officer.

Entry to the ground will constitute unqualified acceptance of these rules and regulations and the rules and regulations of The Football Association and National Football League.

We send our sincere condolences to Colin's wife Maureen, his son David, daughter Sarah and all family and friends. We will hold a minute's silence in honour of Colin just prior to kick-off at today's game and remember his contribution to Hungerford Town Football Club with fondness and pride.

History

This week we take a look at the post-war season of 1946/47 as we take time out to remember those Hungerford players and officials who made the ultimate sacrifice in WW2.

The following extract is taken from Frank Horwood's book entitled 'Hungerford Town Football Club 1886 – 1961 75 Years Football'.

"1946/47 began under the chairmanship of Mr S.J. Amor, with Mr S. Smith as Secretary and backed by a confident entertainment committee, plans were made for many improvements to the ground. The surrounding fence which during the war had nearly disappeared (no doubt the shortage of fuel proving the temptation) was the first consideration.

This was put up entirely by voluntary labour and greatly helped to keep down the cost. Concerning the playing side this season proved to be one of the best ever that the club has enjoyed.

The following trophies were won:

Newbury League Div. 1, Newbury Challenge Cup, Newbury Benevolent Cup, Hungerford Cup, Marlborough Six a Side & Aldbourne Six a Side

Runners Up:
Hungerford Six a Side, Newbury League Div 3 (after play off) & Lambourn Charity Cup

Bob North scored 82 League and 40 Cup goals this season, a club record.

Encouraged by the success of the teams and the efforts of the fund raisers, further plans were made for the ground. A pavilion costing £200 (£4,200 today) was purchased and erected by the artisan members of the club. Tenancy of the ground was agreed with the Town Trustees for a period of 99 years".

It's good to know that not a great deal has changed with the club still heavily reliant on our wonderful volunteers to make improvements and support the club financially although what those gentlemen would make of Hungerford Town today is anyone's guess.

CLUB HISTORY

Dulwich Hamlet Football Club has a long and distinguished history that goes back over one hundred and twenty-five years, but the past few seasons have been as eventful as any that went before.

Despite being locked out of their Champion Hill home in March 2018 in a well-publicised bitter dispute between their landlords and the local council, the club remained strong and on the field the team maintained their focus and push for promotion under long-serving manager Gavin Rose. They were rewarded two months later when Hendon were defeated in a dramatic penalty shoot-out before a 3,321 crowd at their temporary headquarters at Tooting in the Isthmian League Premier Division play-off final to secure promotion.

Dulwich had worked extremely hard for their promotion after an incredible one hundred and eleven seasons as members of the Isthmian League. Four play-off final defeats in seven seasons, including the last two in succession, had stiffened the Hamlet's resolve and backed by impressive crowds, few begrudged them their chance to have a crack at Step 2 football.

The first season in the Vanarama National League South was tough going, especially the first half of the campaign when continuing to ground-share. But, thankfully, they were allowed to return to Champion Hill in December 2018 and not only were the team able to secure their position in the National League South with a 14th-place finish, but the near 3,000 crowds that have attended matches regularly since their return home make them one of the best-supported clubs in Non-League Football.

Last season's League results failed to live up to expectations and the team were hovering around the relegation zone when Coronavirus brought the campaign to a premature halt in mid-March. The highlight of the season was the club's FA Cup run which culminated

in a First Round clash with Carlisle United in front of a full house at Champion Hill, the tie being televised live on BBC's Match of the Day. Hamlet may have lost 1-4 but they gave a commendable performance against the League Two outfit.

The Dulwich Hamlet story began way back in 1893, during the closing years of Queen Victoria's long reign. Towards the end of the summer that year, Lorraine Wilson was handed the princely sum of one shilling and eight pence (less than 10p in today's coinage) by a couple of keen young footballers and asked to start a Dulwich Hamlet Football Club. 'Pa', as Mr Wilson was affectionately known, tackled the task with great relish and over the next thirty years he helped to build Dulwich Hamlet into a powerful force in the world of amateur football.

Life in the early days was difficult. The club's original ground in Woodwarde Road had no changing facilities. On match days the players used to walk half a mile through the streets of Dulwich Village to get from their dressing room to the pitch. Usually they had to carry the goalposts, crossbars and corner flags with them. One consolation was that the players' route took them through the gardens of the local inn where no doubt they paused on their return journey for a post-match drink or two!

Dulwich made their debut in competitive soccer when they joined the local Camberwell League in 1894/95. The following season the championship of that League's 'B' Division became the first entry on what has proved to be a long list of honours. Achieving senior status in 1900, the club proceeded from strength to strength and in 1904/05 they won the Surrey Senior Cup for the first time. They have now won the Surrey Cup a record 16 times, most recently in 1974/75. In 1907 Dulwich gained election to the Isthmian League.

During the First World War, the legendary Edgar Kail joined Dulwich. In his brilliant fourteen-year career with the Hamlet after that war, Kail scored 427 goals (including a club record of 53 goals in the 1925/26 season). He also played three times for the FULL England International side, scoring twice on his debut against France. Kail helped Dulwich to the Isthmian League championship in 1919/20, 1925/26 and 1932/33, two FA Amateur Cup triumphs in 1919/20 and 1931/32, and the London Senior Cup in 1924/25. Another Hamlet legend of that era was goalkeeper Bert Coleman who gained a FULL England cap in 1921, keeping a clean sheet against Wales. Dulwich's other major successes during their heyday between the wars were two more FA Amateur Cup wins in 1933/34 and 1936/37, and another London Senior Cup victory in 1938/39; they were also runners-up in the Isthmian League five times. Incidentally, their 7-1 win over Marine (Liverpool) in 1931/32 equalled the record score for an FA Amateur Cup Final.

Dulwich were quickly into their stride after the Second World War and in 1948/49 they were Isthmian League champions for a fourth time. In 1949/50 they lifted the London Senior Cup again, and it was in the same season that full-back Reg Merritt embarked upon a long career with the Hamlet during which he made a club record 576 appearances. One of the most popular players of the immediate post-war period was flying left-winger Tommy Jover whose career goals tally for Dulwich has only been bettered by Edgar Kail. Tommy completed more than seventy years magnificent service to the club, as player, official and latterly club President from 1985 until his death at the grand age of 91 in 2008. The club's main stand is now named in his honour.

Dulwich were runners-up to Wimbledon in the Isthmian League in 1958/59, but then went through a very lean spell which, apart from three good seasons in the mid 1970s, culminated in relegation from the top division. However, they bounced straight back under manager Alan Smith (who later managed Crystal Palace), winning the Division One championship at the first attempt in 1977/78. Midfield dynamo Chris Lewington was an ever-present that season and he repeated the feat in each of the next four seasons to complete a remarkable 290 consecutive appearances – another club record.

Since the phasing out of amateur football and the end of the FA Amateur Cup in 1974, Dulwich have been a semi-professional club and competed in the FA Trophy. Twice they have reached the quarter-finals, losing to Boston United in a replay in 1979/80, then to Macclesfield Town, again in a replay, in 2016/17.

After their return to the Premier Division in 1978, Dulwich were soon challenging for honours once more and in season 1979/80 they finished third. However, as the 1980s progressed, the club fell on hard times again and despite a London Senior Cup success in 1984 they struggled in the Isthmian League, being relegated to Division One at the end of 1989/90. This time it took them two years to get back to the top flight – an exciting finale to the 1991/92 campaign saw the Hamlet win their last seven league games to pip Boreham Wood for a promotion place on the final day of the season.

It was most appropriate that Dulwich were able to celebrate their centenary in 1993 by moving into a new Champion Hill Stadium. Their famous old ground, which was situated on the same site, opened in 1931 and for a long time was the mecca of amateur football. Numerous Amateur Internationals and other important matches were staged there, including the FA Amateur Cup Final between Kingstonian and Stockton in 1932/33 which attracted a record crowd of 20,744. Sadly, the old ground fell into disrepair over the years and in order to satisfy safety regulations several alterations had to be made which reduced the capacity considerably. Eventually, in 1991, the stadium was totally demolished as part of Sainsbury's redevelopment of the area.

Frank Murphy was appointed as manager in March 1994 and he soon transformed Dulwich into serious championship contenders. In 1995/96 they were the Premier Division's leading scorers and could have won the title but for a hiccup in the closing weeks of the season. Eventually they had to settle for fifth place, but they finished just six points behind the champions, Hayes.

An even higher spot seemed likely in 1996/97, but after Murphy resigned in February 1997 the team slipped down to mid-table and another lean spell followed. During his spell as manager, Dave Garland briefly raised spirits with some long overdue cup success in 1998/99. He guided the team to the first-round proper of the FA Cup for the first time in exactly fifty years (and the fourteenth time overall), before bowing out to an own goal at the hands of Southport. Then, at the season's end, the club celebrated a 2-1 victory over Uxbridge at Charlton Athletic in the final of the London Challenge Cup.

Dulwich finished bottom of the Premier Division in 2000/01 and there followed a long spell in Division One.

CLUB HISTORY CONTINUED

During his period as chairman/manager, Martin Eede brought some stability back to the club and in 2003/04 they came within a coat of paint of regaining a Premier Division spot when they lost 4-5 on penalties to Wealdstone in a promotion play-off. Somehow, after such a heartbreaking experience, the team raised themselves just three days later to win the London Senior Cup, when two goals from Omari Coleman gave them a 2-0 victory over old rivals Tooting & Mitcham United at Hendon. The following season was generally disappointing, but veteran defender Lee Akers joined a select band of players who have reached 500 appearances for the Hamlet. In 2005/06, goalkeeper Paul Seuke became the first player since the late 1980s to appear in every First Team game, although that record was nearly snatched from his grasp until a late substitute appearance in the final fixture, as a forward!

Wayne Burnett succeeded Eede as manager and took Dulwich to the top of Division One South during 2006/07 but after prolific marksman Chris Dickson was sold to Charlton Athletic the goals dried up and the team even failed to make the play-offs. It was all-change at Champion Hill during the summer of 2007. Jack Payne replaced Eede as chairman and Craig Edwards took over as manager. Edwards had two seasons as manager, narrowly missing a play-off spot in 2007/08, before being replaced by current manager Gavin Rose and his assistant Junior Kadi, both former Hamlet players. Rose has blooded several youngsters during his time in charge, with a gradual improvement in results.

For much of the 2010/11 campaign, Dulwich appeared to be drifting towards a third successive mid-table finish, but during the closing weeks they won eight and drew one of their last eleven games to surge up the table and claim the final play-off spot. In the play-off semi-finals, fifth-placed Hamlet upset the

form book with an impressive 3-1 win away to second-placed Bognor Regis Town, who had finished a mere 31 points above them! In the final, away to Leatherhead, Gavin Rose's team were within touching distance of promotion to the Premier Division when they led 3-1 with only minutes remaining; unfortunately, the home side produced a storming finish to draw level deep into stoppage time and then run out 4-3 winners in extra-time. Dulwich also reached the final of the League Cup for the first time but lost 0-2 to Wingate & Finchley.

In 2011/12, Hamlet enjoyed their best season for many a year and were in pole position with three games remaining. Unfortunately, a rare home defeat at the hands of eventual champions Whitehawk proved crucial and they had to settle for a final placing of third. In the play-offs, they defeated Folkestone Invicta 2-1 in the semi-finals, but lost by the only goal in the final away to Bognor Regis Town where a missed penalty sealed their fate.

After the heartbreak of defeat in successive play-off finals, Gavin Rose and his squad had another crack at promotion in 2012/13 and this time they displayed real mental strength, pipping a well-supported and talented Maidstone United outfit to the Division One South title. In an exciting finale to the season, Dulwich drew 1-1 with Burgess Hill Town to finish top of the table, one point clear of rivals Maidstone. The team also reached the League Cup Final, but for the second time in three years fell at the final hurdle, losing 2-3 in extra-time to Concord Rangers.

During Gavin Rose's reign as manager, a number of the club's young players have been snapped up by League clubs, including the likes of Erhun Oztumer (Peterborough United, Walsall, Bolton Wanderers and now Charlton Athletic) and Ethan Pinnoch (Forest Green Rovers, Barnsley and now Brentford).

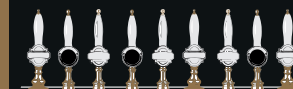

DIOGO BARBOSA

24-year-old midfielder who made his Hamlet debut at the end of February 2020. He was previously with Marítimo in Portugal.

AARON BARNES

24-year-old full-back who made 34 appearances (2 goals) last season, his first at Champion Hill. Began his career with Arsenal's academy and later spent four years with Charlton Athletic where he made his professional debut against Swindon Town in April 2017. He then had a spell with Colchester United.

CHARLES CLAYDEN

19-year-old forward who is currently on a month's loan from Charlton Athletic and made his Hamlet debut in the FA Cup defeat at Eastbourne Borough. He was previously with Leyton Orient.

KUAGICA DAVID

Portuguese central defender, aged 30, who was born in Angola. Signed at the beginning of March 2020, he was only able to make a couple of appearances for Dulwich before the coronavirus pandemic brought last season to a premature halt. Earlier last term he had a spell with Barnstaple Town.

JESSE DEBRAH

20-year-old central defender who signed permanently during the summer after spending the latter part of last

season on loan from Millwall where he had impressed for their Under 23 side. He previously had loan spells with Billericay Town and Eastbourne Borough.

SANDRO EMBALO

24-year-old central defender who hails from Portugal. Had spells with Atlético Madrid and Genoa as a youngster and has joined Dulwich this season.

CHARLIE GRAINGER

24-year-old goalkeeper who joined Dulwich during the summer of 2019 and went on to establish himself as first-choice 'keeper, making 24 appearances last term. An England Under 18 international, he graduated through the youth ranks at Leyton Orient to become a full-time professional and made his League debut in September 2015. Has had loan spells at Histon, Farnborough and Hampton & Richmond Borough.

KORREY HENRY

20-year-old striker signed during the close season from Welling United. He started his career on West Ham United's books and has also gained experience with Yeovil Town, Poole Town, Braintree Town and Bromley.

JORDAN HIGGS

23-year-old central midfielder who is another new signing. A former Bromley youth, he went on to make 150 appearances for the National

League outfit and has also played for Carshalton Athletic.

TYRIQUE HYDE

Attacking midfielder, aged 21, who has also joined Dulwich this season. Previously with Dagenham & Redbridge and Colchester United, he had a spell on loan at Dartford last term.

RENEDI MASAMPU

Left-back, aged 21, who played a few games for Dulwich in pre-season before signing for the Club towards the end of October.

GIOVANNI MCGREGOR

Midfielder, aged 21, who signed for Dulwich towards the end of October. He was previously with Crystal Palace where he played for the Under 23 side.

DANNY MILLS

29-year-old striker who made his name at Whitehawk, scoring over 100 goals for the Brighton-based club and twice helping them to the play-offs. He started his career at Crawley Town, before a spell at Peterborough United and in recent seasons has been with Ebbsfleet United and Welling United. Joined Dulwich during the summer of 2019 and has since become a key player for the Club with 20 goals last season, including a hat-trick in a 5-3 win over Chelmsford City.

SANCHEZ MING

Returned to the Club this

summer for his fourth spell at Champion Hill. Originally a winger, he now plays at right-back and has clocked up over 210 appearances in Hamlet's colours. He started out with Gavin Rose's Aspire Academy side and his former clubs include Fisher Athletic, Welling United, Bromley and Bishop's Cleeve. Aged 30.

DEON MOORE

A strong and powerful forward, aged 21, who has signed after finishing last season with Hemel Hempstead Town. Apart from making four Football League appearances whilst with Peterborough United, he has also had spells with Carshalton Athletic, Bath City (on loan) and Bristol Rovers.

TAIWO OJO

19-year-old left back who is another newcomer. Born in Italy, he was a member of Charlton Athletic's Academy before joining Yeovil Town for whom he made a handful of appearances in both League Two and the National League. Whilst at Yeovil, he spent a period with Melksham Town on loan.

JAMES PARDINGTON

20-year-old goalkeeper who has joined on a season-long loan from Wolverhampton Wanderers. Last season he spent loan periods with Bath City and Stratford Town. He impressed during pre-season and made vital saves in a penalty shoot-out win against Corinthian-Casuals in the FA Cup.

RUBEN SAMMUT

23-year-old midfielder who is a former Chelsea youth who has also had spells with Falkirk (on loan) and Sunderland. He represented Scotland up to Under 21 level and signed for Dulwich at the start of October.

QUADE TAYLOR

26-year-old defender or midfielder who returned to

the Club in September 2016 from Braintree Town. He previously made 12 First Team appearances for Dulwich in season 2010/11 after coming through the youth set-up, before being snapped up by Crystal Palace. He spent two years at Selhurst Park, followed by another two years with Bolton Wanderers, for whom he played one First Team League match against Birmingham City at the end of the 2014/15 season. He has also spent periods on loan at Welling United and Dagenham & Redbridge. Made his 150th appearance for Hamlet in the last game that Dulwich were able to play before last season's shutdown.

MICHAEL TIMLIN

Very experienced player who brings quality and a wealth of experience to the Dulwich midfield. He spent six years at Southend United and a couple of seasons with Stevenage, making some 400 appearances in the Football League. Since switching to the Non-League game, he has also played for Ebbsfleet United.

LEWIS WHITE

Skilful and pacey 21-year-old forward who joined Dulwich at the start of last season after progressing through the Millwall set-up and playing for their Under 23 side. After making 20 appearances, he spent the latter part of last season on loan at Carshalton Athletic.

GAVIN ROSE MANAGER

Former midfielder who is the Club's longest serving manager, having taken charge of over 600 games since August 2009. Originally with the Club in season

2002/03, when he made 40 First Team appearances whilst doubling up as Youth Team manager, he has also had spells with Wimbledon, Charlton Athletic, QPR, Southend United, Bromley, Gravesend & Northfleet and Walton & Hersham amongst others during his long career. In recent years he has been involved in running the Aspire Academy which specialises in coaching youngsters and he also had managerial experience with Beckenham Town whom he led to within a whisker of the Kent League championship. Under his guidance, Hamlet won the Isthmian South title in 2012/13, after reaching the divisional play-off final in each of the previous two seasons; and made it to the Premier Division play-off final three seasons running, defeating Hendon on penalties in the 2017/18 final to gain a coveted place in the National League South. In addition, they were quarter-finalists in the FA Trophy in 2016/17 and have twice reached the Isthmian League Cup Final during his stay. In 2012/13 he became the first Hamlet boss to win a Manager of the Year award.

JUNIOR KADI ASSISTANT MANAGER

Influential midfielder and dead ball specialist who returned to Champion Hill in the summer of 2009 as Rose's assistant. He began his career as a youngster at Coventry City and in 2000 was a member of Kingstons' FA Trophy winning side. He had an earlier spell with the Hamlet in seasons 2001/02 and 2002/03, and his other former clubs include Woking, Slough Town, Lewes, Beckenham Town, Dartford and Carshalton Athletic where he was a key member of the squad that reached the Ryman Premier Division play-offs. He made 183 appearances for Dulwich, the last of which was in season 2012/13.

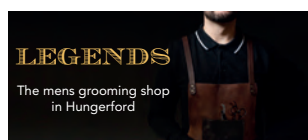
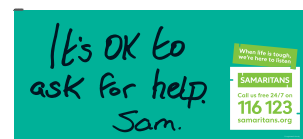

Luke Cairney – Aged 28
