### **Ground Rules & Regulations**

PLEASE TAKE A MOMENT TO **READ THROUGH THE GROUND REGULATIONS OF HAYWARDS HEATH** TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB (the "Club"). **OBSERVING THESE REGULATIONS WILL** MEAN A SAFER, HAPPIER AND MORE POSITIVE EXPERIENCE FOR EVERYONE AT THE CLUB'S GAMES.

Entry to the Thank You NHS Stadium (the "Ground") is expressly subject to acceptance by the visitor of these Ground Regulations and the rules and regulations of The Football Association and The Pitching In Isthmian Football League. Entry to the Ground shall constitute acceptance of these Ground Regulations.

Notwithstanding possession of any ticket, the Club reserves the right to prosecute or to eject or cause to be ejected any persons who within the Ground or is considered by the Club in its absolute discretion to be, or to have been behaving in any of the following ways or otherwise fails to comply with these Ground Regulations:

- Entering the field of play before, during or after
- Uttering, making gestures or indulging in any behaviour that is, or may be construed as being threatening, racist, discriminatory, homophobic, offensive, insulting or abusive;
- Being drunk or under the influence of drink or drugs to any degree; and
- Throwing any object within the ground without lawful authority or excuse.

DO NOT bring into the Ground any bottles, metal cans, glasses, placards, firearms, knives, fireworks, smoke canisters, flares, weapons, dangerous or hazardous items, laser devices or any article that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety. Any person in possession of such items will be refused entry to the Ground.

DO NOT bring into the Ground any sponsorship. promotional or marketing materials save in respect of official club merchandise and/or other football related clothing worn in good faith nor may you offer (either free or for sale by any person) any goods (including literature) of any nature without the express prior written permission of the Club.

DO NOT obstruct gangways, access ways, exits and entrances, stairways and like places. DO NOT smoke within either the Roy Hatt Family Stand or the clubhouse as these areas are strictly smoke-free. Smoking elsewhere within the Ground is permitted in designated areas.

The Club excludes to the maximum extent permitted by law any liability for loss, injury or damage to persons/property in or around the

No guarantees can be given by the Club that a match will take place at a particular time or on a particular date and the Club reserves the right to reschedule the match without notice and without any liability whatsoever.

All persons seeking entry to the Ground acknowledges the Club's right to refuse entry and search any person entering the Ground and to refuse entry to or eject from the Ground any person refusing to submit to such a search.

Any individual who has entered any part of the Ground designated for the use of any group of supporters to which he does not belong may be ejected from the Ground either for the purposes of his own safety or for any other reason.

PLEASE COMPLY at all times with any and all instructions of any steward or officer of the Club and/or any police officer. Failure to comply with any instruction may lead to your immediate ejection from the Ground.

By entering the Ground, all persons are acknowledging that photographic images and/or video recordings (and/or stills taken from video recordings) may be taken of them and may also be used in televised coverage of the game or by the Club or any recognised football authority for marketing or promotional purposes.

Entry into the Ground is confirmation that all persons have consented to such use of their image. If these images should feature an individual prominently the Club will make reasonable efforts to gain the consent of that person before publishing such images, however, if this is not possible, then entry into the Ground shall be deemed consent unless the Club is notified in writing to the contrary.

If any such person is under 18 years of age, the parent, guardian, or responsible adult who is accompanying them into the Ground shall be deemed to have provided consent on their behalf.

Please enjoy matches at the Ground, but remember that if you bring children to matches you remain responsible for their safety and welfare at all times.

In accordance with the Football Association's Standardised Rule 2.13 (Publication of ownership) in relation to Step 1 to Step 6 clubs within the National League System, the legal form of Haywards Heath Town FC is that of an unincorporated association. It has a constitution which sets out the rules that govern its relationship and membership, and elects a management committee to run the organisation on behalf of its members.

# **Today's Opponents**

Hythe Town

### **Club History**

Hythe Town Football Club was formed in August 1910 although football in Hythe can be traced back into the previous century. The club joined the Folkestone and District Leagues and after the First World War had some success, four championships and only once outside the top three in fourteen

They moved up into the Kent Amateur League in 1936 and were promoted into Division One before the Second World War intervened. The 50s and 60s saw little league success but that changed in the early 70s with three successive league titles and a Kent Junior Cup win. Hythe were granted senior status and elected into the Kent League in 1977, playing at the newly acquired Reachfields, an old army sports ground on the edge of the town's firing ranges. The club were runners-up in the Kent League on three occasions but it was not until property developer Tony Walton took over Hythe Town in February 1988 that things really started to happen.

That summer saw the ground developed to Southern League standard with seats and a social club, with viewing balconies, above new dressing rooms. Standing cover extended behind one goal and for the whole of the far side, and floodlights were installed. The ground capacity still remains at 3,000 with the majority under cover. The chairman proved to be a high-profile character who attracted much media attention with his high spending on the ground and team. Town won the 1988-9 Kent League title by 14 points and set a league record of 133 goals. The club gained promotion to the Southern League.

The next season saw another promotion as the main aim, but the club's great run to the FA Vase semi-finals handicapped their league ambitions. with four games a week at times, and a sixth place finish. Hythe lost out to the eventual Vase winners Yeading, winning the home leg 3-2 in front of the club's record attendance of 2,147, but cruelly losing the second leg 2-0 with the crucial goal coming from a big deflection. They did win the Eastern Professional Floodlight Cup at their first attempt.

The following season was very similar, topping the table in November but runs in four cups again caused fixture congestion and a final placing of eighth. Hythe lost out to Trowbridge Town in a Vase quarter-final second replay, lost to Chelmsford City over two legs in the Southern League Cup final, but won the Kent Senior Trophy and retained the Eastern Professional Floodlight Cup. The club played 40 league games and 33 cup

In 1991/2 Hythe again topped the table in the early months but the money was beginning to run out. With little cup success, the exit from the Vase at Evesham United in February saw many of the team sold and their replacements could only finish thirteenth. the club did reach the final of the Kent Senior Cup, losing in extra-time to Bromley at Gillingham's Priestfield Stadium. That match proved to be Walton's last game, and he put the club into liquidation soon after.

Supporters rallied round and entered a scratch side, as Hythe United, into the following season's Kent County League and negotiated continued use of Reachfields Stadium. After three seasons the club regained senior status and in 1995 were elected back into the Kent League but the club would struggle for a number of seasons in the wrong half of the table. In 2001 Hythe dropped the "United" suffix, reverting to "Town" and in November 2002 appointed Paul Fisk as Manager.

This proved a turning point and Hythe became a top six club. There was one exception, in 2005/6. when again the Vase was a distraction, winning five ties before going out to Winchester City in the fourth round, in front of 441 spectators at Reachfields.

In season 2007/8 Hythe forced themselves to the top of the table in March and were considered to be favourites for the title. Disappointment was acute therefore when form was lost in the final weeks and the side not only slipped to fourth place, but also lost in the final of the League Cup. The highlight was a fantastic FA Cup win over Andy Hessenthaler's Dover Athletic before a crowd of 1,109 at Reachfields, and achieving the important Ryman League ground grading.

The club achieved runners-up spot the following season and then Scott Porter, who had been Paul Fisk's assistant manager, took over as manager for the 2009/10 season with Clive Cook as his assistant. There were many good results but too many dropped points saw Hythe finish in third position.

Town also progressed through three rounds of the FA Cup to be drawn against the full-time professionals of Woking who were relieved to escape with a replay after an exciting 2-2 draw at Reachfields. The replay was another tight match until the last few minutes when Woking scored three times to go through 5-1.

The 2010/11 season was possibly the most successful in the history of the club, with Scott Porter and leading the playing side to the Kent League Championship for the first time in over twenty years, and with it promotion to the Ryman League. After a 22-match unbeaten run in the new-year, dropped points over Easter took the

championship to the wire and the league was clinched in dramatic style on the last day of the season through a last-minute equaliser at Tunbridge Wells.

This amazing achievement was coupled with the club's best ever F.A. Cup run, and the best for any Kent League side in over 50 years. Hythe negotiated their way through six rounds, including memorable wins over higher league opposition at Concord Rangers of the Ryman Premier and at home to Staines Town of the Blue Square Bet South. The prize was an away draw in the First Round Proper to League Two side Hereford United. It was one round too far on the pitch, the hosts comfortably winning 5-1 with Gary Mickelborough getting the Hythe goal.

During the 2011/2 season the club maintained their progress and finished in eighth place in Ryman Division One South. Hythe were also able to get their hands on some silverware as wins over Ebbsfleet United and Dover Athletic were followed by a single goal victory in the final at Dartford to win the Kent Senior Cup. The following season ended with a 17-match unbeaten run and a fourth-place finish. This brought about the club's first play-off appearance, unfortunately losing at Faversham Town in the semi-final.

After another eighth-place finish Scott Porter and Clive Cook left the club at the end of 2013/4 and Tim Dixon was appointed as manager in May 2014. It was a disappointing season that saw the club finish in 16th position and after a poor start to 2015-6 the club decided to part company with Dixon in September. Clive Cook returned to take

over, this time as manager and led a remarkable turnaround from 22nd place to fourth as the club qualified for the Ryman South play-offs for a second time. Defeat followed at Worthing in the semi-final. The club ended just outside the play-off

The club parted company with manager Clive Cook in January 2017 as ex-Herne Bay manager Sam Denly took his place arrived to take his place. Again, we ended up just outside the play off places in 2018/2019. A poor start to this season resulted in the departure of Sam Denly to be replaced by Steve Watt in September 2019 before the season was prematurely brought to an end due to the Covid-19 pandemic.

### **Player Profiles**

WILL GODMON Goalkeeper Age 24 Will is an experienced keeper who is his second spell with the Cannons. He started his career in the Chelsea Youth set up before moving to Maidstone United where he had loan spells at Lewes and Faversham Town where he then signed permanently before moving for a short spell at Leatherhead before returning to Salters Lane. He then joined Hythe for his first spell making 50 appearances. He then joined Thamesmead Town before returning to Faversham and then onto Ramsgate before re-joining us in September last year.

NATHAN HARVEY Goalkeeper Age 18 Nathan joined on a month's loan from Charlton Athletic where he has been in the Under 23 squad. He joined Charlton from West Ham United where he was in the youth set-up. He is a exciting prospect for the future.

**DEAN BECKWITH** Defender Age 37 Experienced central defender, Dean ioined us in September from Havant & Waterlooville. He has had an illustrious career starting with Tonbridge Angels before moving on to Gillingham where he had loan spells with Dagenham & Redbridge and Margate. He continued his league career with Hereford United, Luton Town and Northampton Town. He has also played for Eastleigh, Sutton United and Maidstone United.

**TOM WYNTER** Defender Age 30 A highly experienced defender who ioined us from Ramsgate in December 2019. Tom started his career with

Gillingham where he made eight first team appearances before he had spells at Dover Athletic, Dartford & Margate.

NATHAN GORDON Defender Age 27 Former AFC Wimbledon Academy player, Nathan is a 27-year old left back who ioined us from Sevenoaks Town. He has previously turned out for Merstham and Walton & Hersham.

**JAMES ROGERS** Defender Age 28 A highly experienced strong defender who started his career at Dartford before moving onto Dover Athletic. He spent three years at Maidstone United before joining Margate. He joined Hythe in October 2019.

**LIAM SMITH** Defender Age 20 Full Back, Liam joined us from Tonbridge Angels at the start of this season where he came up through the Youth System. He spent a short period of time on loan at Sevenoaks Town last season.

**CHARLIE WEBSTER** Midfielder Age 24 Former Gillingham youth player, Charlie joined Tonbridge Angels following a short loan spell after being released by the Gills. He joined Hythe in the summer of 2016 and is now starting his fourth year with the Cannons as the current club captain.

**ALEX BROWN** Midfielder Age 27 Alex started his career at Gillingham. During that time, he had loan spells with Whitstable Town, Corby Town and Maidstone United. He was then to sign permanently with the Stones. He then went on loan to Leatherhead and made the move permanent in January 2016.

He then joined Dartford before joining Margate.

**ROSS IBBERTSON** Midfield Age 23 Ross came through the youth set up at Gillingham He has also played for Hollands & Blair and East Grinstead Town.

**JARRED TRESPADERNE** Midfield Age 21 Young exciting midfielder who joined in October 2019. He has also played for Folkestone Invicta, Herne Bay, Tunbridge Wells. Corinthian and East Grinstead Town.

**DARREN OLDAKER** Midfield Age 21 Darren was originally with us on loan from Gillingham two seasons ago when he played 14 games for the Cannons before returning to Priestfield. He went into the Gillingham first team for a short while before leaving for Billericay Town.

MORGAN WILLIAMSON Midfielder Age 16 Youngster, Morgan joined us from the Maidstone United youth set up during the Summer. He is a player with a lot of potential for the future.

**BRADLEY IHIONVIEN** Midfielder Age 16 Another youngster who came from Maidstone United. He has a bright future in the game.

**ALEX FLISHER** Striker Age 28 Alex Flisher joined us from Dartford in October 2019 having played most of his career with Maidstone United and Margate. He is a very dangerous winger who causes headaches for defenders.

**FRANNIE COLLIN** Striker Age 33 Experienced striker, Frannie Collin joined us from Margate. He started his career with Gillingham where he made nine first team appearances before moving onto Dover Athletic. He has also had spells with Tonbridge Angels, Maidstone United, Leatherhead and Hastings United.

**TOM WALMSLEY** Striker Age 19 Local lad, Tom is a midfielder who started his senior career at Folkestone Invicta before moving to Whitstable Town. He moved to Hythe in the latter part of season 2018/2019.

KAKA DEMBELE Striker Age 24 Kaka signed in November following his return from Australia where is was playing for Seaford Rangers in the South Australia State League One. He has latterly been playing as a striker but has also played in defence or midfield. He has also turned out for Dartford, Thamesmead Town, Welling United and Greenwich Borough.

**KANE PHILLIP** Striker Age 21 Kane is in his second spell with Hythe originally in February 2019 before leaving for Sittingbourne. He rejoined just before lockdown earlier this year. He is a winger who opened his scoring account with a double against Burgess Hill earlier in the season. He has also played for Herne Bay, Dover Athletic

**NICK DEMBELE** Striker Age 23 Nick joined the club in September having played for Cambridge City last season. He plays mainly on the left-hand side. He has also had spells playing in Gibraltar and for Lingfield, Metropolitan Police. Maidenhead United and Brimsdown.

# **An Interview With ...**

### Mick Cottingham

Following his retirement as Chairman, Michael Cottingham has been interviewed for the Programme by **Editor. Dave Ellmer.** 

Michael you have just handed over the reins of responsibility after seven years in office to Steve Isherwood, how does it feel?

After seven years as Chairman it feels strange, I never felt like a Chairman as everyone just got on with everyone else and made the club run smoothly. # **Ref's Corner**

#### Elbows Ref?!

For today's league game against Hythe Town, I have decided to repeat my column about the illegal use of the elbow and

Players claim that they need to raise their arms to gain leverage when jumping for the ball. While this may be true it is essential that they do not endanger an opponent in the process.

Sadly, sometimes the elbow is used as a weapon to injure an opponent, which is the upper end of the scale.

To get here we need to go through a number of steps which I will guide you through.

At the bottom is two opposing players running next to each other when one makes contact with the other with an elbow. Normally this is accidental and requires no action.

Players using their arms for leverage when jumping for the ball must ensure that they do not make anything other than incidental contact with their opponent.

While contact beyond this can be construed as careless striking, it is often mutual and no action is taken. The reality is that when players are so close some contact is inevitable.

A particular bug bear of mine was players jumping for the ball, from behind their opponent, leading with a forearm.

Normally this caused contact with their opponent regardless of whether they headed the ball or not. Sometimes this contact was with the back of their opponent's head or their neck which can be dangerous.

The claim that the arm was there to prevent their opponent jumping

backwards into them is nonsensical. Have you ever tried jumping while simultaneously leaning backwards?

The next scenario is jumping at an opponent leading with an elbow. The point of contact depends on the height of the elbow and to what extent it is leading.

This can easily result in elbow to head contact and we are now looking at taking disciplinary action against the offender.

The referee must decide if the foul was careless or reckless. Please remember that multiple careless fouls are cautioned as are single reckless ones.

I now want to escalate to those cases where using the elbow represents serious foul play or violent conduct.

Players challenging with a swinging arm are showing total disregard for the outcome of any contact with their opponent. This is not acceptable and endangers safety.

Sometimes simply leading with an elbow will attract a red card due to point of contact and the use of excessive force.

I have seen televised incidents where a player has jumped with an arm raised and then, in a secondary motion, violently thrust their elbow into an opponent.

Elbows are also used to strike an opponent who is alongside them. Making forceful contact, often to their head, is clearly inviting the referee to quickly brandish a red card!

In these examples it can be difficult to decide if the offense was serious foul play or violent conduct. My yardstick was to ask myself if it was part of a challenge which is serious foul play or violent conduct against an opponent.

WHAT'S THE best goal you've seen live? Not necessarily your favourite or one that meant the most, saw your club win something or, dare I say it, avoid relegation. But the best.

Football is subjective. One person's best goal might not be to the taste of another's. Some prefer mazy runs. Others think there's nothing better than a long range strike that crashes in off the underside of the bar.

I was fortunate enough to be at the National League North Eliminator game between Brackley Town and Gateshead a few months ago.

Fans weren't allowed in the grounds. That was a shame for loyal supporters as it is but even more so when Shane Byrne pulled a spectacular rabbit out of the hat on the stroke of half-time.

Gateshead had just gone one up deep in first-half stoppage time and looked for all the world to be heading into the break in front.

But Byrne, apparently, had other ideas. Receiving the ball from kick-off inside his own half, the midfielder hit an inch perfect ball that flew right into the top corner.

Gateshead keeper Brad James had no chance. It wasn't like he'd been caught unawares not concentrating.

It left the handful of people inside the ground open-mouthed. A wow moment. The only problem for me being, I didn't fully see it. I was taking notes down from the first goal. Who shoots direct from kick-off!? I saw it in the air from a long way out, I saw it arrow into the net. I saw 80 per cent of it. But I didn't see the actual strike itself.

So does it count as my best goal witnessed live? It's certainly the best one I nearly saw!
